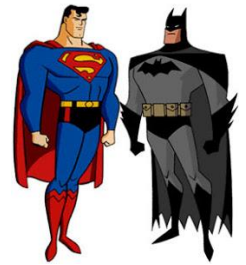

## **GROUP A**

**ENGL151-710 – Topics of Fiction, SUPERHEROES MTWR – 10:30am – 12:30pm (UDDC207)**

**Professor Burns**

Superheroes are everywhere, it seems. They are a common staple of comics, graphic novels, film, television and even serious fiction. Any trope this common, allows for fertile cultural interpretation. This course will explore the idea of the superhero in several ways. We will look at the proto superheroes of history (Odysseus, Arthur, etc.) and how they articulated cultural ideas. We will examine superheroes through the lenses of race, gender and class. The main reader for the class will be the Superhero Reader. In addition we will examine the graphic novel Watchmen and films that portray the superhero. Students will hone their writing skills in short response papers dealing with readings from the reader. A longer paper will focus on the cultural lessons in race and gender taught by superheroes. The class should give students an appreciation of how superheroes become as important as they are in contemporary culture.



## **GROUP B**

**HIST201-710 - Military History MTWR – 8:30am – 10:30am (UDDC307)**

We will explore the history of warfare from primitive man, ancient Greece and Rome, the Middle Ages, the Gunpowder Revolution all the way through World War I, with emphasis upon tactics, weapons, armor, strategy and the human factors that contributed to success or failure in war.

**POSC230-710 Intro to Politics and Social Justice MTWR – 12:30pm – 2:30pm (UDDC110)**

This course focuses on a variety of social movement efforts to address/overcome systems of discrimination and oppression. Students will become familiar with key concepts and issues related to social justice. We will study closely a number of social justice movements in the US and the world, both past and present. Labor, feminist, student, civil rights and environmental movements will be the primary focus.

What is food and what happens when we eat it? How does reproduction work and why might you look more like your mom than your sister? Why are polar bears white? How did we get so many different organisms on Earth? What is the difference between a dinoflagellate and a diatom? Why do we find moss growing where it does? How did humans evolve and why do we look the way we do? Why is it cold in the winter and warm in the summer, and how do organisms deal with changes in their environment?

These are some of the many questions that we will explore in BISC103 Principles of Biology. Are there things about living things that you always wanted to know? If so, bring your questions and we will look for answers.
